2. WELCOME

2. WELCOME

Post-covid Nigeria has continued to experience cultural shifts compelled by new habits and workplace behaviour facilitated by technology. At the BSN, it is remarkable that our Society has responded well to these vagaries through strong fiscal discipline, dynamic management approach, innovation, strategic collaborations, and of course, effectual fervent prayers to the Almighty God. We are not oblivious of the effect of the pandemic on businesses in Nigeria, many of whom have become moribund till date. Again, responsible growth served us well. We did not have any reason to downsize our cherished workforce, nor did any of our activities fail. More importantly, we are positioned well for the future. In the post-pandemic period, we have re-established our organic growth engine. Through a dint of hardwork and dedication, we have doubled our efforts in distributing the Bible and expediting translation activities. We have built and improved upon digital capabilities across every line of our operations to serve our stakeholders. What we are excited about is how our proven operating model sets us up for the future. Going forward, we will leverage our expertise and resources to further our mission and reach more people with the message of the Bible.

4. 55TH NATIONAL BOARD MEETING

The 55th National Board Meeting held in Abuja last year was a remarkable success, thanks to your sacrifices and cooperation. I equally commend the host zone, the North-Central Zone, for executing a memorable event. May I particularly appreciate, on behalf of this Board, the personal sacrifices of our indefatigable Patron, His Excellency, General Dr. Yakubu Gowon, GCFR, former Head of State and Commander in Chief of the Armed Forces, for his dignified presence, robust contributions, and coordination of the activities of the Meeting from start to finish. Sir, we are very proud of you and your relentless contributions to nation building. His Excellency remains the indisputable poster face of the nation in probity and selflessness in public life. Distinguished delegates, if there is anything we owe this icon of international repute, that should be our commitment and rededication to the cause of the Bible work. Those resolutions we reached in Abuja must be transformed into sustainable actions that will impart the lives of the people we serve.

5. PERFORMANCE AND DISCIPLINE

Year 2022 was no doubt a tough year - a year made tougher by a very volatile post-covid economic environment and heightening political tensions. It was also a year that witnessed unprecedented rise in security challenges, including insurgencies, kidnappings, and communal and sectarian violence in the Middle Belt region. All these, no doubt, affected our results. While the General Secretary/CEO will give a detailed analysis of our performance, I wish to commend the stellar performance of some of our leaders at the Areas and Zonal levels, who against all odds were able to exceed the targets set for them. I deeply appreciate these efforts and assert that it can only get better. While some of us are genuinely committed to

fulfilling this divine mandate, it is disheartening that cases of fraud, insubordination and other malpractices that impinge the realisation of our collective goals still abound. You will recall, distinguished delegates, that the National Office has made painstaking efforts to establish effective control mechanisms that help mitigate these odious occurrences such as the preparation and circulation of the Area Devolution document and the Area Workshops. While it is certain that no system is perfect, however, this administration will continue to ensure the institutionalisation of effective control systems and entrenchment of disciplinary culture at every level of our structure and in all our formations across the country.

6. DELIVERING RESPONSIBLE GROWTH IN 2023

My dear brothers and sisters, our Society has come a long way, particularly in delivering sustainable value to Nigerians over the years. Despite the topsy-turvy in our body polity as a nation, the BSN has progressively and vigorously pursued its mandate of making the word of God available to Nigerians in their preferred languages and formats, while also ensuring they engage with it to transform their lives. Last year, we unveiled our new vision statement of growing a community of Nigerian Christians empowered by the Holy Bible to make positive global impact. This will form our trajectory in the coming years. Our activities at the Auxiliary, Areas, Zones, and National Office should be effectively aligned with this vision to ensure we are all on the same path to our El Dorado. In 2023, we must strive to deliver responsible growth within the ambits of these clearly defined vision and mission by ensuring wider and more strategic distribution of the Bible. There should be no excuses to this goal, please. While doing this, we must also consider growth with a customer focus. Technology has greatly redefined the paradigm of business the world over, hence we must leverage technology to relate with our customers through effective communication in the digital and traditional space, provision of adequate information on our products and services, strategic marketing drive, and customer service. Our risk management system must also be top-notch such that incidences and accidents are reduced to the barest minimum through a system of checks and balances, prompt reportage, adherence to laid down procedures, strong ethical behaviour, and sustainable best practices. As the corporate world and governments converge around collaborative sustainability imperatives, we must also strive, at our own levels, to contribute our quota towards addressing social, environmental, human, and economic challenges in the communities where we serve.

7. THE STATE OF THE NATION

Our nation is still plagued by a myriad of challenges which has continued to affect the quality of life of the average Nigerian. In June last year, the nation witnessed the brazen massacre of several Christian worshippers at the St. Francis Catholic Church, Owo, Ondo state, thus highlighting series of coordinated attacks on Christians and the Church in Nigeria. This is apart from the barbarous murder of Miss Deborah Samuel Yakubu, a second-year Christian student, by Muslim fanatics of the Shehu Shagari College of Education, Sokoto. Statistics from *Open Doors*, the reputable US-based non-profit supporting persecuted Christians in the world, ranked Nigeria the 6th country of the world in persecution of Christians in 2023. In 2022, Nigeria was ranked 7th. We hope we don't get to number one anytime soon. However, men

and brethren, this is the situation we find ourselves. We must brace up to the challenge! The intention of the devil and his apparatchiks is to frustrate the spread of the gospel and cower Christians from practicing their faith. We must not allow this to happen! And one of the ways to effectively combat this is to take our Bible work more seriously. I implore us, as fellow soldiers of the cross of Christ, to please, ceaselessly intercede for our nation. The dangerous politicking by the ruling party in foisting a Muslim-Muslim presidential duo in a multi-religious country like ours reinforces the suspicion of an islamisation agenda on the nation. Let us, therefore, be watchful at all times and be ready to defend the gospel of our Lord Jesus Christ with every grace bestowed on us as the Publishers of the Word of God.

8. BIRTHDAYS AND WEDDING ANNIVERSARIES


3. OUR PERFORMANCE IN 2022

I am pleased to report to this Board that our Society performed well in 2022 and we have demonstrated our continued organisational resilience, notwithstanding the unusual events of the year. Leveraging on a more purposeful leadership and ambidextrous management strategy, we have been able to identify and unlock new opportunities, recalibrate our fundraising machinery through effective communication, collaborations, and partnerships, as well as reconceptualise innovative approaches to our programmes and activities. I will now proceed to provide details of our performance in the year under review.

4. TRANSLATION PROJECTS

To the glory of God, the full Okun language Bible was dedicated in Aiyetoro-Gbede, Kogi State on November 3, 2022, amid pomp and fanfare. With this development, we now have the full Bible translated into 27 Nigerian languages, with more translations going on in nine other languages. The ongoing translation/revision projects are: Edo Bible Revision + DC, Urhobo Revision Bible, Yungur First Bible, Izon 1st Bible, Eggon 1st Bible, Epie First Bible, Ogbia First Bible, Nigerian Sign Language Bible and Okpe Bible.

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




A cross section of Okun indigenes ecstatically welcome their Bible

5. BSN BIBLE DISTRIBUTION IN THE LAST FIVE YEARS

Our Bible distribution in 2022 dropped marginally by 16% from the preceding year amounting to 1,725,946 copies as against 2,044,940 copies distributed in 2021. This drop in our distribution figure could be attributed to the continuous nosedive of the Nigerian economy, with inflation skyrocketing to an all-time high of 21.34% and the attendant diminishing of consumers' purchasing power. Prices of foodstuffs and other basic commodities continued to soar higher, while scarcity of petroleum products attained an alarming dimension with prices peaking above 100% increase as marketers in the downstream sector battled with the government over plans to fully implement the deregulation policy. The persistent instability in the foreign exchange market and unprecedented surge in forex rates seriously affected our Bible production and consequently increased the list prices of our Bibles.




These realities notwithstanding, management is committed to evolving proactive and dynamic strategies towards the realisation of our overarching mission of making the Bible available and affordable to Nigerians in their preferred languages and formats. We are constantly reviewing our distribution strategies, whilst putting in place effective cost-cutting measures to help in shoring up our deficits. We are also exploring deeper collaborations and partnerships with our printers and other stakeholders in the value chain to achieve very competitive pricing and value creation in line with our aims and objectives.

6. PROJECT FUNDING DEVELOPMENT IN THE PAST FIVE YEARS

We are eternally grateful to our brilliant supporters, donors and partners who have demonstrated persistent faith in our vision through their generosity to the Bible cause. These donations have been very instrumental to the achievement of the modest successes recorded in our Bible translation efforts and programmes execution that have impacted so much on humanity.



7. 2022 AREAS PERFORMANCE

a. Fundraising in Target Areas

Kwara Area contributed N1,865,730, Ondo contributed N1,312,300, Borno/Yobe contributed N1,200,235, Osun Area I contributed N1,091,500 while Ogbomoso Area contributed N1,000,100. These five Areas exceeded their targets by contributing over N1m. Lagos Area 2 contributed N882,500 while Oyo Area I contributed N837,800. The two Areas paid above N750,000.



d. People with Visual Disability Project - You Can Be Their Eyes

"You Can Be Their Eyes" Braille Distribution Project has made tremendous impacts in the lives of People with Visual Disability (PVD). We received testimonies ranging from spiritual renewal, passion, and hunger to read God's word, and spiritual turnaround. The project has empowered many and liberated them from depression, anger, it has also been a source of inspiration to many People with Visual Disability (PVD) in Nigeria through the power of the word of God.

The testimonies we received from the recipients have further motivated and encouraged us to continue the distribution and reach more visually impaired people who require access to the Bible (The Braille Bible).

The following activities were carried out under this project in 2022:

i. **Braille Bible Distribution**: One hundred and thirty-seven (137) sets of Braille Bibles were distributed to both institutions and individuals from January – December 2022 at a cost of N6,850,000.

ii. You Can Be Their Eyes Bible Quiz (YCBTEBQ)

The 4th edition of **You Can Be Their Eyes Bible Quiz** was held on 6th October 2022 at the auditorium of The Apostolic Church, Palmgrove District Headquarters, Palmgrove, Ikorodu Road, Lagos. The Bible Quiz was organised to promote the reading of Braille Bible and engagement in the Word of God by those who are visually impaired.

A total of 145 people which included students, special guests, BSN staff members, media men and other guests attended the programme physically while 200,173 people viewed it online.

f. NYSC Essay Writing Competition/National Symposium

In a bid to continue to inspire young Nigerians serving their fatherland (Corps members) to be part of proffering solutions to challenging national issues, the IIth edition of the Annual NYSC Essay Writing Competition/National Symposium was organised. The first phase of the Competition/National Symposium started with the essay writing. The topic of the Essay for the competition was **Re-engineering the Nigerian System for Sustainable Development.** We received a total of 176 entries while 163 entries eventually qualified for marking. The second phase of the competition which was the National Symposium was held at the Yakubu Gowon Hall, Bible Guest House, Palmgrove Estate, Ilupeju, Lagos on 18th August, 2022. 100 Corps members were invited along with the six main participants and 384,888 people viewed the event online. The occasion was chaired by Dr. Boniface Chizea, Managing Consultant, BIC Consultancy Services. The State Coordinator, NYSC Lagos, Mrs. Yetunde Baderinwa was also present.

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g. Trauma Healing Project

Activities Carried out under Trauma Healing Project in 2022

- **Trauma Healing Programme:** The Trauma Healing programme is designed to care for and support people who are traumatised as they go through the process of rebuilding their lives using mental health and Bible-based principles.
- Convening Sessions: On 23rd February 2022, convening session was held with heads of schools in Lagos State. 26 Schools and youth ministry leaders were in attendance. Also, convening session was held at the First Baptist Church, Akure on 29th March 2022 and 70 church leaders from 54 churches were in attendance. Convening sessions were held in Akwa Ibom on 22nd July 2022, South-South Nigeria and Abuja (FCT) on 20th August 2022 with 88 and 16 church leaders respectively.
- Initial Equipping Sessions: Initial Equipping Session was held in Lagos for teachers and
 other people that work with children in May 2022. 49 people were certified as apprentice
 facilitators with words of encouragement to form more healing groups. Requests were
 made by Prison Fellowship of Nigeria and Chapel of Christ Our Light, University of Lagos,

for Initial Equipping Sessions. 20 participants from Prison Fellowship of Nigeria and 14 participants from Chapel of Christ Our Light were trained. The Chapel of Christ Our Light fully funded the training. Prison Fellowship of Nigeria also funded their training but got funding for their accommodation.

Advanced Equipping Sessions: Advanced equipping session was held at the Bible Guest House, Lagos on 24th-28th October 2022. Two facilitators were certified as Master-Facilitators in Training, seven as Training Facilitators and two as Healing Group Facilitators.

Audio Trauma Healing Programme: BSN collaborated with the Faith Comes By Hearing (FCBH) to train 117 people on Audio Trauma Healing in Lagos. At the end of the training, 114 people were certified as Audio Training Facilitators while the remaining three were not certified because they did not complete their sessions.

Also, on 21st-25th November 2022, Audio Trauma Healing Programme was held in Lagos. 10 facilitators were certified as Audio Trauma Healing Facilitators while 15 persons were certified as Listening Group Leaders.

• Community of Practice: The community of practice which was held at the Bible Guest House Lagos on 24th and 25th August 2022, brought together, mental health professionals and our certified Trauma Healing Facilitators to share ideas on how to further help traumatized people in Nigeria. There were 80 participants in attendance.

Airing of Audio Trauma Healing on Radio

To further reach out to more traumatised people, Audio Trauma Healing was aired on the following Radio stations - Ashiwaves FM Benue, Metro FM Lagos, Nigeria Info Port Harcourt, Bond FM Lagos, and Splash FM Ibadan.

Healing Group Session

1,129 people were reached through 97 healing and listening group sessions.

h. Macedonian Call

Macedonian Call is a project targeted at restoring the dignity and hope of the Internally Displaced Persons (IDP) due to Boko Haram/Terrorists attacks, communal clashes, flood, and various other causes. The project commenced fully in 2018 and since inception, it has been a source of blessing to the Internally Displaced Persons and people living in slums. In 2022, IDP Camps in Benue, Abuja, Adamawa and Makoko, Lagos were visited and lots of relief materials were shared. The following activities took place in the year under review:

2022 Project Activities

- 1. Need Assessment was carried out in IDP camps in Abuja, Adamawa, Benue, and Lagos to determine the needs of the people and the approach of presentation in each camp.
- 2. Relief materials such as clothing, beddings and shoes were sourced from Churches and individuals. Nine bags of gently used clothes were received from churches, charity organisations and individuals. More relief materials are needed to make the programme more robust.
- 3. 927 units of Back-to-School packs which comprised exercise books and school bags were distributed to the school children in the IDP camps visited.
- 4. Relief materials were distributed to Wuro-jabbe IDP camp in Adamawa on the 26th of September 2022, Karonmajigi and new Kuchingoro camps Abuja on the 28th September 2022 and Durumi Area one and Kuje camps in Abuja on the 29th September 2022. Relief materials were distributed to pupils, parents and teachers at Makoko Anglican Primary School, a slum area in Lagos on Friday, 16th December 2022.

- 5. Mini Trauma Healing sessions were conducted at Abagana IDP camp in Benue State on 31st December 2022. Many of the beneficiaries were taken through a session on forgiveness, and some of them were able to let go of their bitterness. Many realised they had been carrying lots of burdens resulting from unforgiveness which made it difficult for them to relate with God. After the Trauma Healing session, they made the decision to forgive all those that hurt them and move forward.
- 6. A total of 3,905 beneficiaries got relief materials while 2,104 copies of Bibles (Yoruba 90 copies, My 100 Best-Loved Bible Stories 470, KJV 456, Hausa 834 and TIV 254 copies) were also distributed to the beneficiaries.

i. Marathon Bible Reading (MBR)

The Marathon Bible Reading was organised to resuscitate the dying reading culture in Nigeria particularly the reading of the Word of God. The 20th Edition of the Marathon Bible Reading was held between 5th and 9th of September 2022. The MBR started with an opening ceremony which was held at the Williams Hills Memorial Methodist Church, Ebute-Meta, Lagos on the 4th of September, 2022. The programme was officially declared opened by the General Secretary/CEO of The Bible Society of Nigeria, Pastor Samuel Sanusi. The event was well attended by staff members of BSN and the members of the Church. The Lagos Area I

Chairman, Rev. Obafemi Aina was present at the event. The programme was covered by News Agency of Nigeria (NAN), TVC, Guardians Newspaper, and Punch Newspaper.

A total of 6,569 participants were recorded from all the 172 reading centres. The reading began with Genesis and ended with the book of Revelation. Three Churches were able to complete the reading of the whole Bible within the week - C & S Movement, Ayo Ni O, Km 4, Apapa-Oshodi Express Road, Sanya, Lagos, Christ Anglican Church, 4-6, Church Street, Elere, Near Elere Police Station, Agege and The Apostolic Church Nigeria, Abesan District, Abesan Lagos. The languages read were English, Yoruba, Igbo, Hausa, Efik, Arabic, Egun and French.

My encounter with the word of God brought about sudden healing in my leg as I no longer feel the pain." Elder Awolaye Gabriel Oladuntoye, from First ECWA Church, Omu Aran, Kwara State.

Recovery of Sight during the MBR

Mrs. Adeyemo Omowumi (from Griffin Memorial Reading Centre) testified to the healing of her sight. When she came for the 2021 edition, she could not read the Bible. The coordinator of the centre prayed for her that day, and she was able to read without glasses from that day on. She came for the 2022 edition and read without glasses.

a. Church Relations

The Nigerian church remains a critical stakeholder in the Bible work. To this end, we ensured a progressive symbiosis with the church and its leaders during the period under review. Over 196 churches were visited nationwide in collaboration with the Areas and these visits have been very impactful to the Society.

b. Courtesy Visits/Calls

In furtherance of our determination to solidify the relationship between the Society and Christian leaders, some strategic courtesy visits/calls were made to prominent church leaders, among whom were Bishop Dr. David Oyedepo, Pastor Poju Oyemade, Pastor Emmanuel Olumide, Rev. Sam Aboyeji and Pastor Elijah Abina. Other eminent personalities visited were Barr. Dele Adesina (SAN), Dr. Erastus Akingbola, Engr. Bayo Adelore and Bro. John Obaro.

c. Christian Leadership Summit

A Christian Leadership Summit was organised on 10th February 2022 in conjunction with the American Bible Society and the United Bible Societies. The event which held at the prestigious Radisson Blu Hotel, Ikeja, Lagos had in attendance the Vice-President of the Federal Republic of Nigeria, Prof. Yemi Osinbajo, GCON, SAN. Other distinguished personalities that graced the occasion include former President Chief Olusegun Obasanjo, GCFR, former President of the Christian Association of Nigeria, Dr. Samson Ayokunle, President of the Pentecostal Fellowship of Nigeria, Bishop Dr. Francis Wale Oke, wife of the Edo State Governor, Mrs. Betsy Obaseki, among others. The American Bible Society was represented by the Director of Global Philanthropy, Mrs. Jane Jelgerhuis, while the UBS was represented by Mr. James Catford, Global Ambassador, UBS and former CEO British and Foreign Bible Society. The highly successful event was a rare opportunity for BSN to effectively communicate its fundamental objectives, vision, mission, and activities to a crème-de-la-crème audience and to also set in motion, collaborative action plans to take the Society to the next level.

d. New Bible House

To the glory of God, our quest for a new Bible house is gradually coming to fruition with the acquisition of a property measuring 2,610.402 square metres in land space on 202/204 lkorodu Road, Palmgrove, Lagos at a cost of N500m. Efforts are now geared towards the construction of our dream property.

13. UBS/INTERNATIONAL NEWS

As part of our collaboration with the United Bible Societies (UBS) and other international partners, your GS/CEO participated at some key strategic meetings and conferences. Some of them were the International Book Fair in Germany, the Sahel Initiative Conference in Abuja as well as the Africa Bible Leadership Initiative Forum (ABLI) in Uganda. These events, no doubt, helped solidify our contacts with our foreign partners, broadened our perspectives on issues and helped advance our cause among relevant stakeholders within the Bible societies fellowship.

14. BEREAVEMENT

It is without doubt that the death of our loved ones diminishes us. Yet, while in grief, may we take solace in the comforting words of the Lord as captured in Psalms I 16:15a "Precious in the sight of the LORD is the death of his saints." The National Executive Committee (NEC) submits its report together with the financial statements of The Bible Society of Nigeria (**Society**) for the year ended 31st December, 2022.

1. Results N '000

The surplus of income over expenditure for the year 422,771

2. Principal activities

The **Society** engages in the translation, production and distribution of Bibles and other Christian scriptures, programmes and fundraising to support its principal activities.

3. National Executive Committee responsibilities

The National Executive Committee Members are responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of these financial statements in accordance with Companies and Allied Matters Act 2020 and International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) in compliance with the Financial Reporting Council of Nigeria Act, No 6, 2011 and for such internal control as the National Executive Committee Members determine are necessary to enable the preparation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement whether due to fraud or error.

In doing so, NEC ensures that:

- proper accounting records are maintained;
- internal control procedures are instituted which, as far as is reasonably possible, safeguard the assets, prevent and detect fraud and other irregularities;
- applicable accounting standards are complied with;
- suitable accounting policies are adopted and consistently applied;
- judgments and estimates made are reasonable and prudent; and
- the going concern basis is adopted, unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Society will continue in business.

4. Property, Plant and Equipment

Movements in property, plant and equipment during the year are shown in Note 6 on page 70. In the opinion of the Committee, the market value of the **Society's** properties is not less than the value shown in the financial statements.

5. Distributors

The **Society** has a network of Depots and Areas throughout Nigeria in order to ensure that its products are brought as close as possible to end users.

6. Suppliers

The **Society** procures materials (scriptures and scripture-related materials) from Thompson Press, Nutech Print Services, Bible Society Resources, Bible Society of Brazil, Amity Printing Press (China), and Copenhagen Publishing House. All transactions are done at arm's length.

7. Employment and Employees

a) **Employment of disabled persons**

It is the policy of the **Society** that there should be no discrimination in considering applications for employment including those from disabled persons. The **Society** has seven (7) deaf employees. All employees whether or not disabled are given equal opportunities to develop their experience and knowledge and to qualify for promotion in furtherance of their careers.

Health and safety regulations are enforced within the **Society's** premises and employees are aware of existing regulations. The **Society** provides subsidies to all levels of employees for medical, transportation, housing and meal.

c) Employees' involvement and training

The **Society** is committed to keeping employees fully informed as far as possible regarding the Society's performance and progress and in seeking their views wherever practicable on matters which particularly affect them as employees.

Training is carried out at various levels through both in-house and external courses.

8. Auditors

The auditors, Messrs Giwa-Osagie, DFK & Co., having indicated their willingness, will continue in office as the **Society's** Auditors in accordance with Section 401 (2) of the Companies and Allied Matters Act 2020. A resolution will be proposed at the Annual General Meeting authorizing the National Executive Committee to fix their remuneration.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 2022

1 General Information

1.1 Legal form

The Bible Society of Nigeria was incorporated on 8th February 1966 as a **SOCIETY**. The Society has its registered office at Bible House, 18 Wharf Road, Apapa and branches nationwide and is a member of The United Bible Societies.

1.2 Principal Activities

The principal activities of the **Society** include the translation, production and distribution of Bibles and other scriptural literature as well as fundraising activities to support its principal activities and organizing programmes.

1.3 Going concern status

The **Society** has consistently been generating surpluses. The National Executive Committee believes that there is no intention or threat from any source to curtail significantly its line of business in the foreseeable future. Thus, these financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis.

1.4 Financial period

These financial statements cover the financial period from 1st January 2022 to 31st December 2022 with comparatives for the financial period from1st January 2021 to 31st December 2021.

2 Application of new and revised International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS)

The **Society** has applied all new and revised IFRSs that have been issued as at 31st December 2022

3 Significant accounting policies

3.1 Statement regarding status of compliance with IFRS

The **Society's** financial statements for the year ended 31st December 2022 are presented in accordance with, and comply with International Financial Reporting Standards (IFRS) and International Financial Reporting Interpretations Committee (IFRIC) interpretations issued and effective at the time of preparing these statements.

3.2 Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis except for financial instruments that are measured at revalued amounts or fair values, as explained in the accounting policies below. Historical cost is generally based on the fair value of the consideration given in exchange for assets.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 2022 (Cont'd)

3.3 Employee Benefits

3.3.1 Defined contribution plan

The **Society** operates a defined contribution based retirement benefit scheme for its staff in accordance with the Pension Reform Act of 2004 (as amended).

3.3.2 Other employees benefits

Other short and long-term employee benefits are recognised as an expense over the period in which they accrue.

3.4 Taxation

The **Society** is a non-for-profit entity. Consequently, its surpluses or deficits are not subject to Companies Income and Education Taxes.

3.5 Revenue recognition

Revenue is measured as the fair value of the consideration received or receivable and represents amounts receivable for goods and services provided in the normal course of business, net of discounts.

In general, the following specific recognition criteria stated in Notes 3.5.2 to 3.5.4 must be met before revenue is recognized:

3.5.1 Surplus

Surplus of income over expenditure for the year is ploughed back into the Organisation for translation and is not available for sharing.

3.5.2 Distribution

Revenue from distribution is recognized when the Society has transferred to the end users the significant risks and rewards of ownership of the products supplied. Significant risks and rewards are generally considered to be transferred to the end users when they have taken undisputed delivery of the products.

3.5.3 Donations

Donations are recognized as revenue when received and all associated obligations have been met. Where donations have been given for a specific purpose or with conditions attached, income is not recognized until agreed upon services and conditions have been satisfied.

Donated assets are recognized at their fair value at the date of the donation. Like many other charitable organizations, Bible Society of Nigeria receives the benefit of people's time and services carried out free of charge . This type of donation cannot be readily quantified and hence, it is not recognized in the financial statements.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 2022 (Cont'd)

3.6 Foreign currency translation

For the purpose of these financial statements, the results and financial position of the **Society** are expressed in Naira, which is the functional currency of the **Society** and the presentation currency for the financial statements. The functional and presentation currency was determined by the National Executive Council (NEC) and this is explicitly documented in the accounting policies manual approved by the NEC.

In preparing the financial statements of the **Society**, transactions in currencies other than the entity's functional currency (foreign currencies) are recognized at the rates of exchange prevailing on the dates of the transactions. At each reporting date, monetary assets and liabilities that are denominated in foreign currencies are retranslated at the rates of exchange prevailing at that date. Non-monetary items carried at fair value that are denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rates prevailing at the date when the fair value was determined. Non-monetary items that are measured in terms of historical cost in a foreign currency are not retranslated.

3.7 Property, plant and equipment.

All items of property, plant and equipment are stated at historical cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairments. Historical cost includes expenditure that is directly attributable to the acquisition of the items.

Subsequent costs are included in the asset's carrying amount or recognised as a separate asset, as appropriate, only when it is probable that future economic benefits associated with the item will flow to the Society and the cost of the item can be measured reliably. The carrying amount of the replaced part is derecognised. All other repairs and maintenance are charged to statement of comprehensive income during the financial period in which it is incurred.

Depreciation on property, plant and equipment is charged to the statement of comprehensive income using the straight-line method so as to write off the cost less their residual values over their estimated useful lives. The estimated useful lives, residual values and depreciation method are reviewed at the end of each reporting period, with the effect of any changes in estimate accounted for on a prospective basis.

An item of property, plant and equipment is derecognised upon disposal or when no future economic benefits are expected to arise from the continued use of the asset. Any gain or loss arising on the disposal or retirement of an item of property, plant and equipment is determined as the difference between the sales proceeds and the carrying amount of the asset and is recognised in the statement of comprehensive income. An asset's carrying amount is written down immediately to its recoverable amount if the asset's carrying amount is greater than its estimated recoverable amount.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 2022 (Cont'd)

3.8 Impairment of tangible and intangible assets excluding goodwill and financial assets.

At the end of each reporting period, the **Society** reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible and intangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that these assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). When it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the **Society** estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. When a reasonable and consistent basis of allocation can be identified, corporate assets are also allocated to individual cash-generating units, or otherwise they are allocated to the smallest group of cash-generating units for which a reasonable and consistent allocation basis can be identified.

Intangible assets with indefinite useful lives and intangible assets not yet available for use are tested for impairment at least annually, and whenever there is an indication that the asset may be impaired.

Recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in the income statement, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation decrease subject to the available surplus in the revaluation reserve.

When an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or a cash-generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or cash-generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in the income statement, unless the relevant asset is carried at a revalued amount, in which case the reversal of the impairment loss is treated as a revaluation increase.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 2022 (Cont'd)

3.9 Inventories

Inventories are stated in the financial statements at the lower of cost and net realisable value. Item of inventory which include purchase cost and other costs incurred to bring the materials to their location and condition, are valued at weighted average cost.

Other consumables are also valued at weighted average cost after making allowance for obsolete and damaged stocks. Engineering spare parts with high value and held for commissioning of a new plant or for infrequent maintenance of plants are capitalised and depreciated over their useful life and the useful life starts when they are put to use. If the estimated useful life of the spare parts from installation exceeds that for the whole plant, depreciation is limited to the remaining life of the plant.

3.10 Financial Instruments

Financial assets and financial liabilities are recognised when the **Society** becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and financial liabilities are initially measured at fair value. Transaction costs that are directly attributable to the acquisition or issue of financial assets and financial liabilities are added to or deducted from the fair value of the financial assets or financial liabilities, as appropriate, on initial recognition, except for transaction costs relating to financial assets or financial liabilities at fair value through profit or loss, which are recognised immediately in profit or loss.

3.10.1 Financial assets

Financial assets are classified into: (a) loans and receivables, (b) held-to-maturity investments (c) Available-for-sale and (d) financial assets at fair value through profit or loss. Financial assets are subsequently measured based on their nature and purpose as determined at initial recognition. The company does not have financial assets classified as held-to-maturity and at fair value through profit or loss.

Loans and receivables

Loans and receivables are non-derivative financial assets with fixed or determinable payments that are not quoted in an active market. Loans and receivables including [trade and other receivables and cash and bank balances] are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less any impairment.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 2022 (Cont'd)

Amortised cost is calculated by taking into account any discount or premium on acquisition and fees or costs that are an integral part of the effective interest rate (EIR). The EIR amortisation is included in finance income in the statement of comprehensive income. The losses arising from impairment are recognised in the income statement in finance costs. Interest income is recognised by applying the effective interest rate, except for short-term receivables when the recognition of interest would be immaterial.

3.10.2 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand and highly liquid short-term investments that are easily convertible into known amounts of cash and are subject to insignificant risks of changes in value.

Bank overdrafts which are considered in arriving at cash and cash equivalent in the statement of cash flows are treated as borrowings under the current liabilities in the statement of financial position.

Impairment of financial assets

Financial assets, other than those at fair value through profit or loss (FVTPL), are assessed for indicators of impairment at the end of each reporting period. Financial assets are considered to be impaired when there is objective evidence that, as a result of one or more events that occurred after the initial recognition of the financial asset, the estimated future cash flows of the investment have been affected.

Loans and receivables

For financial assets carried at amortised cost, the amount of the impairment loss recognised is the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of estimated future cash flows discounted at the financial asset's original effective interest rate. If in a subsequent period, the amount of the impairment loss decreases as a result of an event occurring after the impairment was recognised, the previously recognised impairment loss is reversed through profit or loss to the extent that the carrying amount of the investment at the date the impairment is reversed does not exceed what the amortised cost would have been had the impairment not been recognised.

For financial assets carried at cost, the amount of the impairment loss is measured as the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the present value of the estimated future cash flows discounted at the current market rate of return for a similar financial asset. Such impairment loss will not be reversed in subsequent periods.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 2022 (Cont'd)

3.10.3 Derecognition of financial assets

Financial assets are derecognised only when the contractual rights to the cash flows from the asset expire, or when the Society transfers the financial asset and substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset to another party. If the Society neither transfers nor retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership and continues to control the transferred asset, the Society recognises its retained interest in the asset and an associated liability for amounts it may have to pay. If the Society retains substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of a transferred financial asset, the Society continues to recognise the financial asset and also recognises a collateralised borrowing for the proceeds received.

On derecognition of a financial asset in its entirety, the difference between the asset's carrying amount and the sum of the consideration received and receivable and the cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income and accumulated in equity is recognised in profit or loss.

On derecognition of a financial asset other than in its entirety (e.g. when the Society retains an option to repurchase part of a transferred asset), the Society allocates the previous carrying amount of the financial asset between the part it continues to recognise under continuing involvement, and the part it no longer recognises on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts on the date of the transfer. The difference between the carrying amount allocated to the part that is no longer recognised and the sum of the consideration received for the part no longer recognised and any cumulative gain or loss allocated to it that had been recognised in other comprehensive income is recognised in profit or loss. A cumulative gain or loss that had been recognised in other comprehensive income is allocated between the part that continues to be recognised and the part that is no longer recognised on the basis of the relative fair values of those parts.

3.11 Financial Liabilities

Financial liabilities are classified as either financial liabilities 'at Fair Value Through Profit or Loss' or 'other financial liabilities'.

Other financial liabilities

Other financial liabilities (including borrowings and trade and other payables) are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

The effective interest method is a method of calculating the amortised cost of a financial liability and of allocating interest expense over the relevant period. The effective interest rate is the rate that exactly discounts estimated future cash payments (including all fees and points paid or received that form an integral part of the effective interest rate, transaction costs and other premiums or discounts) through the expected life of the financial liability, or (where appropriate) a shorter period, to the net carrying amount on initial recognition.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER, 2022 (Cont'd)

Derecognition of financial liabilities

The **Society** derecognises financial liabilities when, and only when, the Society's obligations are discharged, cancelled or they expire. The difference between the carrying amount of the financial liability derecognised and the consideration paid and payable is recognised in profit or loss.

4 Critical accounting judgments and key sources of estimation of uncertainty

In the application of the **Society's** accounting policies, which are described in note 3, the Members of the National Executive Committee are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

The following is the critical judgement and estimate that the NEC has made in the process of applying the **Society's** accounting policies and that have the most significant effect on the amounts recognised in financial statements.

Property, plant and equipment

Property, plant and equipment represent a significant proportion of the asset base of the **Society**. Therefore the estimates and assumptions made to determine their carrying value and related depreciation are critical to the **Society's** financial position and performance.

The charge in respect of periodic depreciation is derived after determining an estimate of an asset's expected useful life and the expected residual value at the end of its life. Increasing an asset's expected life or it's residual value would result in the reduced depreciation charge in the statement of comprehensive income.

The useful lives and residual values of the property, plant and equipment are determined by management based on historical experience as well as anticipation of future events and circumstances which may impact their useful lives.

Depreciation/amortisation on other assets is charged to the statement of comprehensive income using the straight-line method so as to write off the cost less their residual values over their estimated useful lives on the following bases:

The Society is not subject to any externally imposed capital requirements.

23.3 Risk management

Risks management roles and responsibilities are assigned to stakeholders in the Society at three levels: the National Executive Committee (NEC), Management Committee and Line Managers.

The Board oversight function is performed by the NEC through the appropriate Committees.

The second level is performed by the Management Committee.

The third level is performed by all Line Managers under Management Committee and their direct reports. They are required to comply with all risk policies and procedures and to manage risk exposures that arise from daily operations.

The Internal Audit Department provides an independent assurance of the risk framework. It assesses compliance with established controls and recommendations for improvement in processes are escalated to relevant Management Committee and National Executive Committee.

The Society monitors and manages financial risks relating to its operations through internal risk report which analyses exposures by degree and magnitude of risks. These risks include market risk (including currency risk and interest rate risk), credit risk and liquidity risk.

23.4 Market risk

The Society's activities expose it primarily to financial risks of changes in foreign currency exchange rates.

Market risks exposures are measured using sensitivity analysis.

There has been no change to the Society's exposure to market risks or the manner in which these risks are managed and measured.

23.5 Foreign currency risk management

The Society undertakes transactions denominated in foreign currencies; Consequently, exposures to exchange rate fluctuations arise. The Society is mainly exposed to USD.

A Foreign Exchange Loss/Gain Reserve of N534,418 has been created for the management to determine how to write off in the shortest possible time considering the Society activities.

During the year, the Society met its financial obligations to its foreign suppliers with various foreign exchange rates. This resulted in foreign exchange gain / (loss) shown below:

23.6 Liquidity risk management

Liquidity risk is the risk that the Society will encounter difficulty in meeting obligations associated with financial liabilities that are settled by delivering cash or another financial asset.

Ultimate responsibility for liquidity risk management rests with the National Executive Committee, which has established an appropriate liquidity risk management framework for the management of the Society's short-, medium- and long-term funding and liquidity management requirements. The Society manages liquidity risk by maintaining adequate reserves, banking facilities and reserve borrowing facilities, by continuously monitoring forecast and actual cash flows and by matching the maturity profiles of financial assets and liabilities.
